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## ABOUT THIS GUIDE

This guide gives a description and general overview of the ATM Switch Fabric Module. It describes how to install the Switch Fabric Module into the CoreBuilder<sup>®</sup> 9000 chassis, and how to power on and interpret the LEDs of the CoreBuilder 9000.

This guide is intended for the system administrator, network equipment technician, or network manager who is responsible for installing and managing interface modules designed for operation with the network hardware such as CoreBuilder 9000 ATM switches. It assumes a working knowledge of network operations and familiarity with communications protocols used in networks.

This guide is intended for *trained technical personnel* only. Do not attempt to remove or replace a CoreBuilder 9000 ATM Switch Fabric Module if you have not had the proper training from 3Com. For training information, call 1-800-NET-3COM.

	The Module Status LED indicates the ATM Switch Fabric Module's status. The dual PCMCIA slot has two indicator LEDs and the Console port has one indicator LED. The PCMCIA slot can hold a 10BASE-T Ethernet LAN PC card to support a management Ethernet connection should one be required.
Switch Fabric Module Redundancy	The design of the CoreBuilder 9000 switch allows for an optional hot standby switch fabric module that replaces the active module in case the active module fails.
	Under normal operation of the switch, the standby switch fabric module automatically receives all the configuration updates that are made in the active switch. In the event of an active switch fabric module failure, the standby switch fabric module takes over immediately and the system resumes normal operation in 30 - 45 seconds (depending on the CoreBuilder 9000 switch configuration), exhibiting the resiliency required of a highly available network core service.

### **Safety Precautions**

When you handle components in a CoreBuilder 9000 system, be sure that you follow all safety precautions. To avoid electric shocks, burns, fire or equipment damage, read and follow these warnings:



**WARNING:** Hazardous energy exists within the CoreBuilder 9000 System. Use extreme caution when you install, remove, or replace the ATM Switch Fabric Module.



**WARNING:** The ATM Switch Fabric Module must be installed, removed, or replaced only by trained service personnel.



**WARNING:** When the CoreBuilder 9000 system is on, never insert metal objects, such as a screwdriver into open module slots and be sure to remove all hand worn jewelry (such as watches and rings). When the system is on, do not touch any connections within the chassis with your fingers. Do not insert metal objects into the backplane.



**WARNING:** Do not plug in, turn on, or attempt to operate an obviously damaged module.

### Laser and LED Safety Information



**WARNING:** To ensure optical safety when you install the ATM Switch Fabric Module, comply with this precaution:

Although the data communications LEDs and lasers that are used in this product meet the regulatory requirements for casual exposure to the eye, as with any bright source of bright light, 3Com recommends that you do not look into the light source (Class One Laser/LED Product).

### ESD Safety Information

Electrostatic Discharge (ESD) can damage components on the module. ESD, which occurs when the module is handled improperly, can cause complete or intermittent failure.

- Make sure that you are properly grounded. Use a footstrap and a grounded mat, or wear a grounded wrist strap, ensuring that the strap makes good skin contact.

Unpacking Procedure	Use the following procedure when you unpack the ATM Switch Fabric Module:		
1	Verify that the ATM Switch Fabric Module is the correct model. Compare the model number listed on the side of the shipping carton with the model number that you ordered.		
2	Remove the module, in its antistatic bag, from the shipping carton.		
i>	All shipping cartons are reusable. After removing the contents, replace the packing materials and store the shipping carton for future use.		
3	Remove the ATM Switch Fabric Module from the antistatic bag and inspect it for damage. If the module appears to be damaged, replace it in the antistatic bag, return it to the shipping carton, and contact your local supplier.

Installation Equipment	<ul> <li>To install the ATM Switch Fabric Module you need:</li> <li>The ATM Switch Fabric Module with its antistatic bag</li> <li>A #2 flat-blade screwdriver</li> </ul>
Preparing the Chassis	Slots 8 and 9 in the CoreBuilder 9000 16-slot chassis are available for installing the ATM Switch Fabric Module. (In the 8-slot chassis slots 7 and 8 are used for this purpose.) Slot numbers are located on the top of the chassis for easy identification. Figure 2 shows the 16-slot chassis.

The CoreBuilder 9000 16-slot chassis is shipped with slot 8 open; slot 9 is covered with a protective faceplate. The active ATM Switch Fabric Module is installed in slot 8. A standby Switch Fabric Module is installed in slot 9 when two switch fabric modules are being used for switch redundancy purposes.



In the 8-slot chassis, the active ATM Switch Fabric Module is installed in slot 7, and the standby Switch Fabric Module is installed in slot 8. Figure 3 shows the 8-slot chassis.

### **Removing the Protective Faceplate from the Chassis**

If you want to install a standby ATM Switch Fabric Module in slot 9 (slot 8 in the 8-slot chassis), you must remove the protective faceplate from the slot as follows:

- 1 With a #2 flat-blade screwdriver, loosen the captive screws.
- 2 Slide the faceplate out of the chassis and place it aside for future use.



If you are not using a particular slot at this time, 3Com recommends that you leave its protective faceplate on.

**Installation Procedure** To install the ATM Switch Fabric Module into the chassis:

**1** Pick up the ATM Switch Fabric Module and hold it in a vertical position, with the faceplate facing you and the LEDs at the top, and the components facing to the right (Figure 4).

Figure 4 Holding the ATM Switch Fabric Module Vertically





**CAUTION:** Be careful not to twist or bend the module as you insert it.

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- **2** Align the module with the proper slot guides as described, and slide the module partially into the slot. Make sure that the top and bottom edges are in the same slot.
- **3** Open the module ejector handles completely (Figure 5).

**WARNING:** Hazardous energy levels exist inside of the chassis. Do not place hands or objects into the chassis or touch components on an inserted module.

**4** Push on the captive screws to further insert the module, until it is completely into the slot and the module ejector handles begin to close (Figure 6).

26 ..... **5** To engage the module connectors into the chassis backplane connectors, push both module ejector handles simultaneously inwards toward the front panel, locking the module (Figure 7). You feel a slight resistance as the connectors engage.







**CAUTION:** If the resistance is too great, the ATM Switch Fabric Module and backplane connectors may not be aligned. Forcing the ATM Switch Fabric Module inward can damage the module connectors or backplane connectors. If necessary, remove and reinsert the ATM Switch Fabric Module, ensuring that the connectors are properly aligned. Do not tighten the captive screws to seat the module. **6** Using the #2 flat-blade screwdriver, tighten the two screws located on the top and bottom of the ATM Switch Fabric Module (Figure 8).







**CAUTION:** To ensure adequate cooling air flow in the chassis, make sure that protective faceplates cover all empty slots.

 Removing an ATM Switch Fabric Module from the 8-Slot Chassis or the 16-Slot Chassis This section describes how to remove an ATM Switch Fabric Module.

To remove an ATM Switch Fabric Module:

- **1** Record the cabling scheme.
- **2** Disconnect all cables from the ATM Switch Fabric Module.
- **3** Loosen the two captive screws that secure the ATM Switch Fabric Module to the chassis (Figure 9).





- **4** Move the module ejector handles to the outward position (Figure 10).
- **5** Gently slide the ATM Switch Fabric Module out of the chassis.

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Installing an ATM Switch Fabric Module into the 7-Slot Chassis	This section describes how to install an ATM Switch Fabric Module into the CoreBuilder 9000 7-slot chassis.	
Installation Equipment	<ul> <li>To install the ATM Switch Fabric Module you need:</li> <li>The ATM Switch Fabric Module with its antistatic bag</li> <li>A #2 flat-blade screwdriver</li> </ul>	
Preparing the Chassis	Slot 7 (the upper full-size slot) in the CoreBuilder 9000 7-slot chassis is available for installing the ATM Switch Fabric Module. Slot numbers are located on the left side of the chassis for easy identification (Figure 11).	

The CoreBuilder 9000 7-slot chassis is shipped with slots 1, 7 and 8 open. In the 7-slot chassis, you can install only one Switch Fabric Module.





**Installation Procedure** To install the ATM Switch Fabric Module into the chassis:

1 Pick up the ATM Switch Fabric Module and hold it in a horizontal position, with the front panel facing you and the LEDs at the left, and the components facing on top (Figure 12).







**CAUTION:** Be careful not to twist or bend the module as you insert it.

2 Align the module with the proper slot guides as described, and slide the module partially into the slot. Make sure that the both edges are in the same slot.

**3** Open the module ejector handles completely.



**WARNING:** Hazardous energy levels exist inside of the chassis. Do not place hands or objects into the chassis or touch components on an inserted module.

32 ..... **4** Push on the captive screws to further insert the module, until it is completely into the slot and the module ejector handles begin to close (Figure 13).

**5** To engage the module connectors into the chassis backplane connectors, push both module ejector handles simultaneously inwards toward the front panel, locking the module (Figure 14). You feel a slight resistance as the connectors engage.

**6** Using the #2 flat-blade screwdriver, tighten the two captive screws located on the left and right of the ATM Switch Fabric Module (Figure 15).

 To remove the ATM Switch Fabric Module:
 Record the cabling scheme.
 Disconnect all cables from the ATM Switch Fabric Module.

**3** Loosen the two captive screws that secure the ATM Switch Fabric Module to the chassis (Figure 16).

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- **4** Move the module ejector handles to the outward position.
- **5** Gently slide the ATM Switch Fabric Module out of the chassis (Figure 17).

## INSTALLING AND REMOVING THE PCMCIA LAN PC CARD

This chapter describes how to install and remove the PCMCIA LAN PC Card, which is included with the ATM Switch Fabric Module. You can install this card in the 7-slot chassis, 8-slot chassis or 16-slot chassis. In the 8-slot chassis and 16-slot chassis, you can use one PCMCIA card in each ATM Switch Fabric Module.

### Installing the PCMCIA LAN PC Card

The ATM Switch Fabric Module has two slots for PCMCIA cards. One 10BASE-T Ethernet LAN PC card is packaged with the ATM Switch Fabric Module. You install the PCMCIA Card into slot 1 (the right-hand slot) in the ATM Switch Fabric Module following the instructions written on the label affixed to the card.



The PCMCIA Card is optional; the system functions without the card. In Release 3.00, you can use only one PCMCIA card in the ATM Switch Fabric Module. The other slot remains empty.

Two types of card are available:

- 3Com MegaHertz 10Mbps LAN PC Card #3CCE589EC (supplied with the ATM switch).
- EtherLink<sup>®</sup> III LAN/PC #3C589D-COMBO card



**CAUTION:** You may install **only one of these cards** into the ATM Switch Fabric Module. Do not attempt to install any other PCMCIA card.

### Installation Equipment

To install the ATM Switch Fabric Module PCMCIA LAN PC card, you need:

- The ATM Switch Fabric Module
- A PCMCIA LAN PC card (included with the ATM Switch Fabric Module)

**Installation Procedure** To install the PCMCIA LAN PC card into the ATM Switch Fabric Module:

- **1** Hold the card with the female connector facing away from you (Figure 18).
- 2 Insert the card into slot 1 (Figure 19).







**CAUTION:** Do not force the card into the slot.

## **POWER-ON AND SYSTEM STATES**

4 Turning on appropriate LEDs

This section describes the behavior of the ATM Switch Fabric Module LEDs during power-on.

### **Module Status LED**

The Module Status LED indicates the system state of the ATM Switch Fabric Module. This LED is located on the top of the ATM Switch Fabric Module (Figure 20).

Figure 20 ATM Switch Fabric Module LEDs



During the power-on phase, the Module Status LED blinks green. When the power-on phase has completed successfully, normal operation begins and the Module Status LED stops blinking and remains a steady green. If one of the power-on diagnostic tests fails, the Module Status LED turns to steady yellow. The entire power up phase takes about 30 seconds. Table 3 shows the Module Status LED indications.

LED Indication	Blinking?	System Event
Off	No	Incomplete insertion of the ATM Switch Fabric Module, or no power to unit.
Green	Yes	Power-on sequence in process.
Green	No	Power-on sequence completed with no errors and operational software executing normally.

### Active and Standby LEDs

The Active and Standby LEDs (Figure 20) indicate the ATM Switch Fabric Module operative status. Usually, the switch module in slot 8 has only the active LED lighted. The standby switch in slot 9 has only the standby LED lighted. These LEDs are turned on during power-on. In the event of a configuration or software update, the standby LED may turn yellow.

### **Console Status LED**

The Console Status LED (Figure 20) is green when the console function has been enabled and the ATM Switch Fabric Module can be managed through the console port; otherwise it is yellow. This LED is turned on during power-on.

### **PCMCIA Status LEDs**



The PCMCIA slot 2 is permanently disabled; its LED does not light when a PCMCIA LAN PC Card is inserted into the slot.

The PCMCIA card, is installed into slot 1. When the card is installed into the slot, the slot 1 LED is lit. If there is no card in the slot, the LED does not light.

During normal operation, the PCMCIA Status LED indicates the state of the LAN PC card Ethernet interface installed in its slot. Table 4 summarizes the three states of the LAN PC card.

LAN PC card failure.	No	Yellow

- **Normal Operation** After successful completion of the power-on phase, the ATM Switch Fabric Module begins to function in the normal state. Under normal operation, the Module Status LED is steady green. If a failure in the ATM Switch Fabric Module occurs, the Module Status LED turns a steady yellow.
  - **Failure** A failure state in the ATM Switch Fabric Module is indicated in two ways:
    - The Module Status LED turns yellow.
    - The Module Status LED blinks green for more than 30 seconds.

## **CONFIGURATION AND FAST SETUP**

This chapter describes how to configure the Switch Fabric Module and to setup the CoreBuilder<sup>®</sup> 9000. It contains the following topics:

- Configuring the ATM Switch Fabric Module
- Starting Up
- Integrated Fast Setup Operation

### Configuring the ATM Switch Fabric Module

After you have physically connected the ATM Interface Module to your site network devices and power has been applied, you must define some parameters that enable the ATM Switch Fabric Module to function within the network.

The CoreBuilder 9000 ATM Enterprise Switch local management software features an Integrated Fast Setup procedure that configures the CoreBuilder 9000 Enterprise Switch and all ATM Interface Modules that are installed in the CoreBuilder 9000 in one process.

Although you can use other methods to define the parameters (discussed in the *CoreBuilder 9000 ATM Enterprise Switch Management Guide*), the Fast Setup is the fastest and easiest method of defining the essential parameters that are needed to get your network running.

3Com recommends that you run the Fast Setup program after you have installed the ATM Interface Modules and ATM Switch Fabric Modules.

If you are installing the ATM Interface Module and the ATM Switch Fabric Module at the same time, you only need to perform the Integrated Fast Setup procedure once; both modules will be configured.

If you have already installed and configured the CoreBuilder 9000 ATM Enterprise Switch and you now want to add a new ATM Interface Module, perform the Integrated Fast Setup procedure again, but now you configure only the UNI/NNI parameters section for the ports of the new ATM Interface Module.

By default the port type is set to UNI unless configured otherwise. At the Use single step configuration prompt, enter  $\mathbf{y}$  to go through the steps without making changes, or enter  $\mathbf{N}$  to get more detailed information and to make changes.

To enter the UNI/NNI configuration:

- 1 At the NNI max hops prompt, enter the maximum number of hops (0-120).
- 2 At the Use single step configuration prompt, enter **y** to go through each existing port, or **n** to enter a specific port. If you enter **y**, the Enter port ID prompt is displayed automatically for each existing port.

If your CoreBuilder 9000 includes many ports, use the single-step configuration option by entering **Y** at the Use single step configuration prompt. If you want to configure a specific port, enter **N** at the prompt, and then enter the port number at the Enter port ID prompt.

- **3** At the Enter port ID prompt, enter or accept the Port ID for each port (1-4), including the slot number (1-7, 10,12,14,16), the group number (1 or 2) and the port number (1-4).
- 4 At the NNI type of port prompt, enter or accept the NNI type for the port you just specified. The port can be UNI (enter υ), E-IISP (enter E), IISP (enter I), or PNNI (enter P).
- 5 Repeat steps 3 and 4 until you have specified the NNI type for all of the ports that are in the CoreBuilder 9000 ATM Enterprise Switch chassis. When you are finished, enter 0.
- **6** The LMA automatically prompts you for the NNI type of the ports that you have specified as Gateway. Specify the NNI type as User or Network.
- 7 Repeat until you have specified all of the Gateway ports.

### IP and Management Configuration

In this section you are prompted for the IP and Management Configuration parameters: IP address, NMS address, default gateway, and subnet mask. Enter values as appropriate. These parameters support an NMS (Network Management Station) that is connected to the ATM Switch Fabric Module through the PCMCIA Ethernet port.

**Confirmation** This section prompts you to save all changed parameters and whether you want to reboot.

To save the changes, enter  $\mathbf{y}$ , otherwise enter  $\mathbf{N}$ .

To reboot, enter  $\mathbf{y}$ , otherwise enter  $\mathbf{N}$ . The main menu appears.

The Integrated Fast Setup of the ATM Switch Fabric Module and the ATM Interface Module is now complete.



All the configuration settings are automatically transferred to the standby switch fabric module.
